New Clubhouse Policy

In order to simplify the process for Settings Owners to use the Clubhouse, we have updated the Clubhouse reservation procedures. An email was sent from FSR to all Owners on 11/3/2021, providing two new clubhouse documents: "The Settings of Black Mountain Clubhouse Access Agreement" and "The Settings of Black Mountain Clubhouse Usage Policy" (both dated 9/30/2021). These two documents replace the previous clubhouse policy document.

A summary of the new process and changes

- Owners will complete "The Settings of Black Mountain Clubhouse Access Agreement" when requesting a Clubhouse Openpath access code from FSR. This agreement needs to be completed in order to have general access to the clubhouse. The Owner will no longer need to submit an agreement for each individual event held in the clubhouse.
- When requesting a clubhouse access code/card, Owners will receive a copy of "The Settings of Black Mountain Clubhouse Usage Policy", which contains detailed information about reserving and using the clubhouse for Owner events.
- Clubhouse reservations can be requested online by filling out the request form on The Settings web site calendar page, or by emailing the Clubhouse Coordinator (clubhouse.tsobm@qmail.com).
- There will no longer be any fees or deposits required for an Owner to reserve the clubhouse for an event.

If you already have an Openpath access app or card for the Clubhouse, and have not yet completed "The Settings of Black Mountain Clubhouse Access Agreement", please submit it to FSR at

<u>SettingsofBlackMountain.NC@fsresidential.</u> <u>com</u>. Starting on 2/1/2022, each Owner will need to be in good financial standing with the HOA and have a signed agreement on file with FSR in order to retain their clubhouse access.

The Place We Live -

Black Mountain College

Founded in 1933, Black Mountain College focused on fine arts education—but the education was not always text-book, so to speak. The teachers and students lived together as a community and learned from one another. One writer stated "As the college evolved, it assumed characteristics of a small college, a summer camp, a religious retreat, a pioneering community, an art colony and a farm school." In a way, it defies categorizing—it is, simply, Black Mountain College.

The list of teachers and students at Black Mountain College reads like a virtual who's who of 20th Century arts, including musicians, painters, poets, actors, dancers, fiber artists, sculptors, and architects. Names like Robert Rauschenberg, Walter Gropius, Robert Motherwell, Josef Albers, John Cage, Charles Olson, Buckminster Fuller, Merce Cunningham and Willem de Kooning.

The North Carolina Archives accepted the college's administrative records after it closed in 1956. The papers and the manuscript collections associated with students and faculty have long been popular with researchers who traveled to Raleigh from all over the world to study the influential college. The archives' collections related to Black Mountain College were transferred a few years ago to the Western Regional Archives, closer to the home of the college and to Asheville's Black Mountain College Museum + Arts Center, a facility that explores and preserves the legacy of the college through exhibits and programs. http://www.ncmarkers.com/Markers.asp x?MarkerId=P-64
